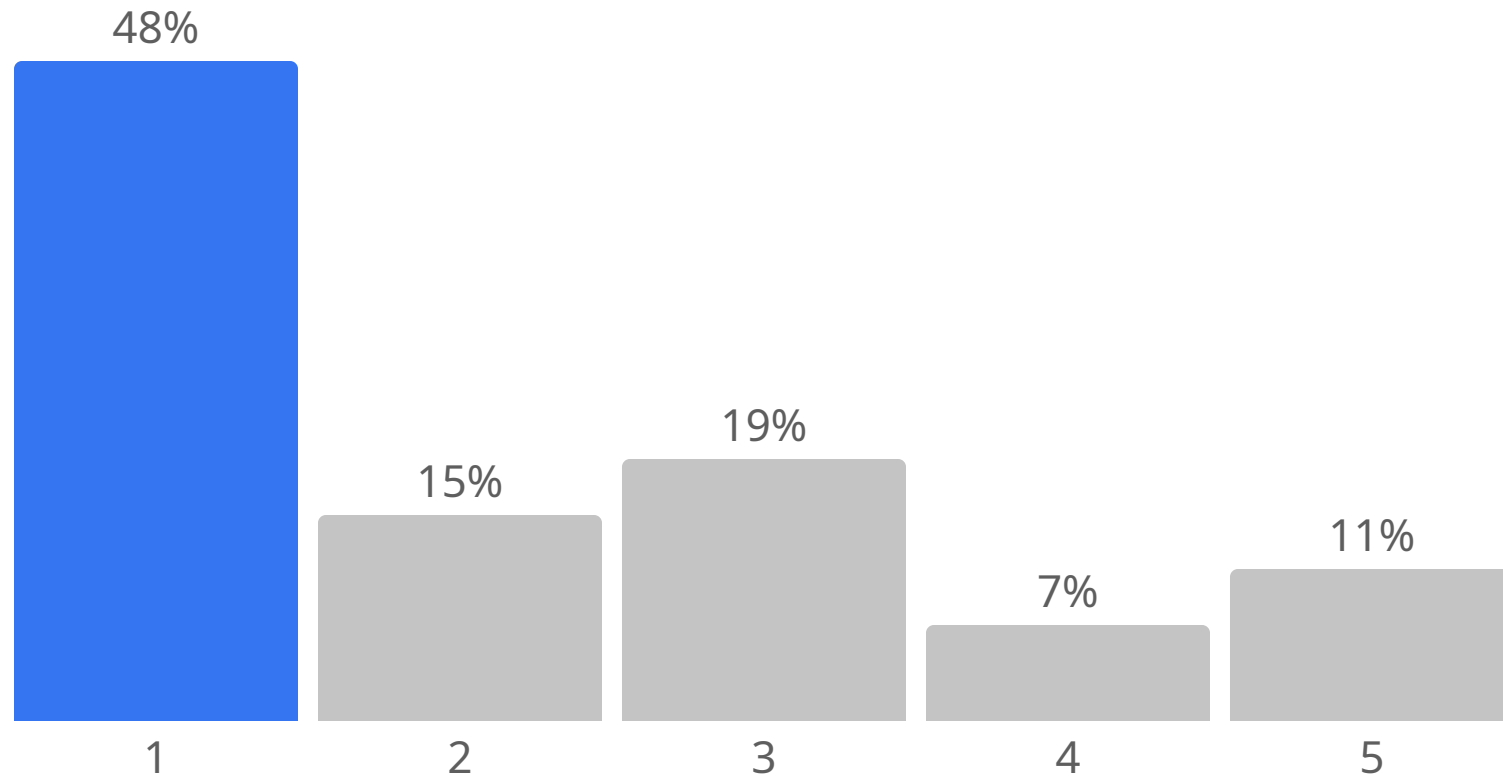

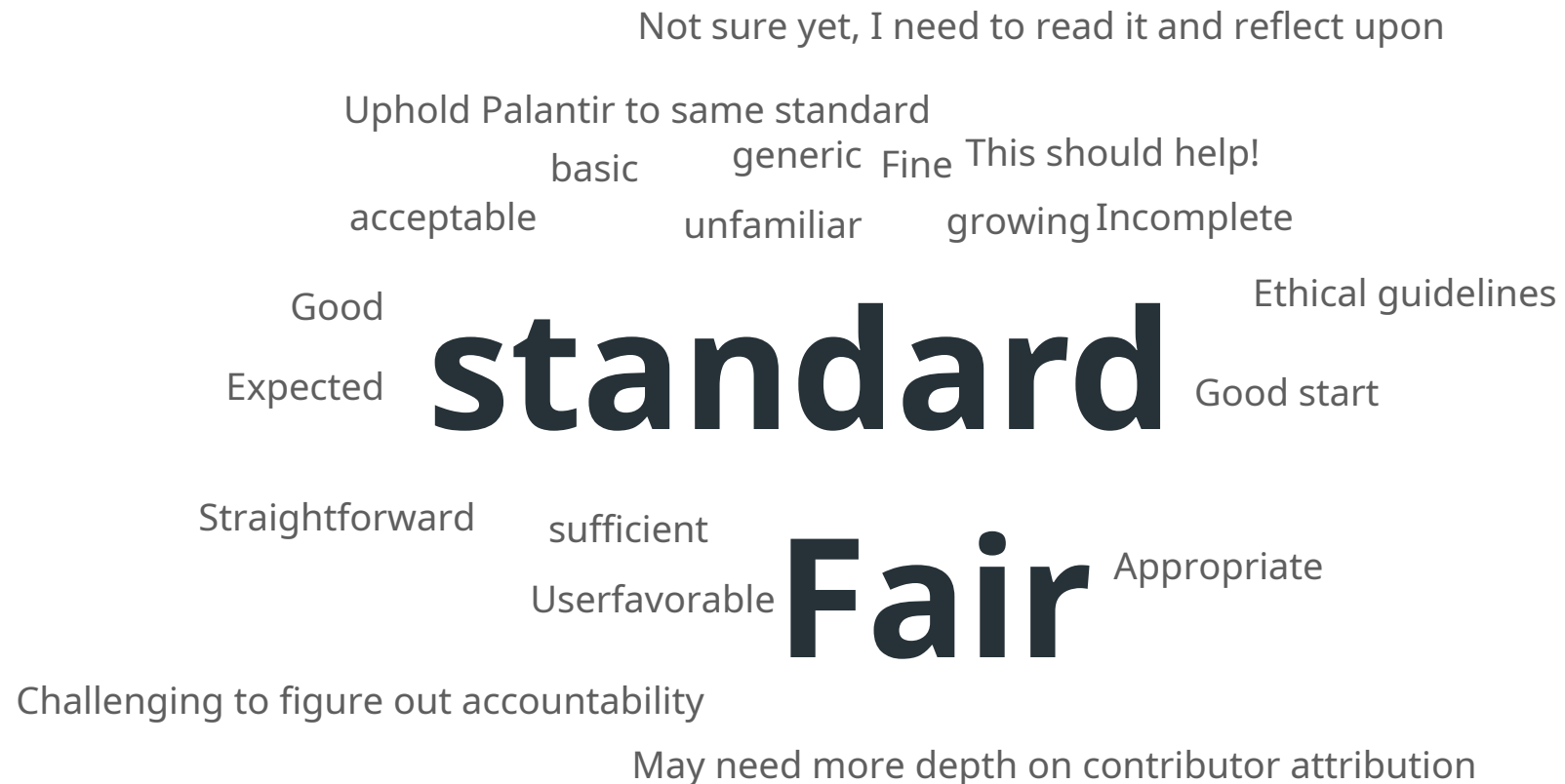

- Technical controls are not the issue, public perception that Palantir touches the data is a huge risk for institutional participation. No technical control or code of conduct solves this.
- Expansion into federated “bring your own compute”
- Collaborations with other NIH Institutes and Centers
- potential implications for evidence of researchers using the data for purposes beyond what was approved, including for non-research purposes (e.g., business development)
- What type and forms of data are acceptable?
- Ability to scale high performance compute via DOE resources
- Requirements for accessing data
- Means to determine if violated
- US only vs. the international research community
- Approved use cases beyond "research" generically
- commercialization
